

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS AS OF 4/06/2020

1. What is the difference between Isolation and Quarantine?

Isolation and quarantine help protect the public by preventing exposure to people who have or may have a contagious disease.

- **Isolation** separates sick people with a contagious disease from people who are not sick.

Quarantine separates and restricts the movement of people who were exposed to a contagious disease to see if they become sick. For more information, go to this link:

Understanding Governor Kelly's STAY HOME ORDER

YOU SHOULD:	YOU SHOULD NOT:
 Shop for essential food and medication. There is no need to panic buy or stock pile.	 Host or attend gatherings. This includes play dates, dinners, or other social activities.
 Spend time outdoors. Take a walk or spend time in your yard. Maintain a safe distance from others you encounter.	 Gather in outdoor spaces. Enjoy outdoor activity alone or with members of your household.
 Stay connected via phone or video chat. Social distancing does not mean isolation.	 Go shopping in groups or with your entire household. Whenever possible send only one person out for supplies.
 Leave the house only when absolutely necessary. Necessary trips include reporting to an essential job or seeking medical care.	 Travel for non-essential purposes. Out-of-state travelers to high-risk areas should self-quarantine for 14 days.

3. Am I allowed to order food to be delivered to Haskell from local eateries?

*****Effective tonight, 4/6/2020 --NO FOOD DELIVERIES ARE ALLOWED FOR TWO WEEKS.** It will be re-evaluated on (4/20/2020). The public is being informed that the virus will be the most dangerous for the next two weeks.

4. Haskell has a **NO** visitation policy in place in all residential halls. Can I still meet and visit with someone outside on the outdoor furniture?

The NO VISITATION ORDER prohibits visits from off-campus students to visit on-campus students and also prohibits on-campus students to visit off-campus students.

Visits between residential halls are **STRONGLY DISCOURAGED**. No gatherings of more than 5 people are allowed, and not at any common areas because Haskell cannot disinfect those areas. While short walks on campus are encouraged, student visitations are at students' own risk.

5. What sort of reasons would be appropriate for us to leave campus for?

There are **NO** reasons that would be appropriate for students to leave campus. Doctor appointments are being cancelled. If you need to purchase something, you can contact a counselor --Monica Jackson (mljackson@haskell.edu) or Manny King (mking@haskell.edu)

Some "over the counter" items might be supplied by Haskell Health Center. You can contact Pharmacy at 785-832-4822 or a provider at 785-832-4810. Students are also encouraged to sign a "Release of Information" form with Haskell Health Center to keep communication lines open and information shared more expeditiously. 6. What constitutes a "store run?"

"Store Runs" are strictly prohibited.

7. What about my mail?

Students are instructed to contact the Haskell Mail Center for any personal mail they receive. They will need to contact the office to set up an appointment to pick up items from the mailbox. FOR RESIDENTIAL HALL STUDENTS WITH REMAINING BELONGINGS

1. When can I come by to collect my belongings?

NO. At this time, it will not be possible to come get their things. The next two weeks are critical and the virus is expected to get worse during this time. **An announcement will go out to everyone when it will be deemed safe to retrieve your belongings.**

2. Can students come by to pick up their things if they just pick it up and go?

NO. At this time, it is not safe to come get their things. Anyone traveling from out of state will have to self-quarantine for 14 days which defeats the purpose of stopping the spread of the virus.

3. Can I get my belongings mailed to me if I pay for the cost?

Haskell will box and store your belongings and keep it stored until you return to campus in the fall semester. **Only 2020 May graduates will have their belongings mailed to them**
