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Self-reported positive case of COVID-19 on Haskell Indian Nations University Campus — statement from the university below.



Dear Haskell Community,

On Tuesday, March 31, 2020, a Haskell Indian Nations University student self-reported that the student tested positive with COVID-19. In compliance with the requirements of the Clery Act, a federal mandate to notify campus community of issues of health and safety, the University is sending this Emergency Notification to the campus community.

The student is currently in isolation in an on-campus residence hall. The student may have encountered other students on campus. The University and/or Douglas County Emergency Response team will determine who those individuals may be and will be contacting those individuals. Staff who provide food and safety/security services to the residence halls have been notified and all safety practices continue to be communicated. Housing staff and University Services are in direct contact with the student and communicate regularly for the student's health and safety needs.

**Students, faculty and staff presenting symptoms of COVID-19 must immediately self-isolate. Students, staff and faculty remaining on campus or in the local Lawrence area who develop symptoms can call the Haskell Health Center at 785-832-4810 or their primary care provider or local public health department for guidance.**

Continue to practice social distancing per the guidelines of the CDC at <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/index.html>. The University will continue to follow recommendations of public health officials and infectious disease experts to further reduce community transmission of the virus.

The University has reduced the density of our campus population to slow the spread of the virus and avoid overwhelming health care and community systems. Haskell has moved all course instruction to remote delivery, requested that employees work remotely if possible, and reduced the number of students who are permitted to remain in residence halls. The University does have employees who are deemed essential working on campus.

**The University has now closed the campus to any outside visitors, including recreational and campus grounds, including the Haskell Stadium and Billy Mills Trail, as well as community use of the library and cultural center.**

We continue to monitor this rapidly changing situation. The health and wellbeing of our campus community continues to be our highest priority. The best place to find information on Haskell's response to coronavirus is at [www.haskell.edu](http://www.haskell.edu).



**Míghthíoní Rodas** Haskell has made it clear from the beginning that they could not force students to leave, but that if students left for spring break and went to areas of high risk, they strongly encourage them to stay gone to prevent spread. Nobody was forced, encouraged yes, but ultimately the decision was on the student. And each student made that decision by themselves. As Jared stated, many of us do not have homes to go to if we left. Saying that Haskell should've made arrangements to reach out to ppl's tribe is misleading. Haskell ultimately never had to, they most definitely could have but they were funding all exit plans and needs and every other single thing you could think of from their own resources, not that individual's tribe. Why waste more time reaching out and waiting on responses when Haskell can do it themselves? That's how they approached the situation and I'm appreciative of them for that. Think about it, Haskell reaching out to our tribes and saying "hey this person doesn't have anywhere to go, but they're enrolled with you guys and we're trying to shut our doors so you need to take them" sounds more like a foster parent giving a child back to the system. It doesn't work like that. Or "hey we have so and so here at the university and they're apart of your tribe, we need to come up with a plan to get them home" like naahhhh they took it into their own hands and handled it themselves. Im also so proud of them for not succumbing to panic and taking every student into consideration rather than kicking us all out and basically just telling us "good luck" like the other universities you're comparing Haskell to did. Some people would end up going home only to be homeless, or denied from shelters who already had their doors shut. Haskell also paid for everyone to get home point blank. The ones who said they needed it and even students who just wanted food for the ride back, it was given to them without hesitation as far as I know and from what I witnessed. Haskell even provided plane and bus tickets to students who live less than eight and three hours away. Everything has been handled and continues to be handled in a VERY professional and considerate manner. Our population is small compared to KU's which I think puts us at an advantage. I'm wondering why you have this idea that because Haskell DIDNT shut down that they've doomed the students and staff here? Or put them at risk? That's my understanding from your comments and the verbiage you chose. You don't see what us students currently on campus see, and I can honestly say that the risk everyone here has of getting COVID is the same as it was a month ago, or even longer ago. All in all, this is new territory for everyone, nobody's ever had to worry about something like this but when it comes down to it I strongly believe that the way things were done were completely ETHICAL

**Eddie Lehman** I think it's obvious from some people's comments they have no familiarity with epidemiology and virology. If they did they would know that taking a large group of people, isolating them together, with a common meal system is a recipe for disaster.

And above you see people making arguments with information that refutes their conclusion. I won't detail it item by item, but just one example. Someone made the comment not to worry, the person who is contagious stays isolated in a separate building away from everyone. Do they? Then how did they contract the virus? Do you know where they get their meals? Have they come in contact with the Food Service staff? And they contacted the Administration, how did they do that, by phone or in person? Do you know?

It's a virus speed through the air and in contact and can be transported up to 29 feet, it remains active on metal surfaces for up to several days.

The letter says the Administration was notified on Tuesday. Today is Friday, that's four days later. That itself is a crime if this is just now being released. That also doesn't take into account the days prior to the student notifying the administration and what and who they may have contacted prior.
